Janet Horvath on Injury Prevention

Janet Horvath, cellist with the Minnesota Orchestra from 1980 to 2012, will speak at Flute Fest about injuries related to flute playing.

Her book, *Playing (less) Hurt—An Injury Prevention Guide for Musicians*, won the gold medal in the health category from the Independent Publishers Book Awards 2009, and attracted the attention of the world-wide publisher Hal Leonard Performing Arts Publishing Group. The book is now available Internationally at halleonardbooks.com in a rewritten, redesigned and updated 2010 edition.

Horvath's noted seminars have been presented for professional orchestras, for youth orchestras, at conservatories, conferences, festivals, workshops and for hospitals from coast to coast and recently at the Westminster Reference Library of the Performing Arts, in London England.

A trail-blazer in speaking and writing openly about the physical stresses experienced by musicians she has contributed importantly to the awareness of musicians' work related ailments and their prevention.

The Suzuki Flute Choir Composer Quest

This year at the Flute Choir Showcase, the Suzuki Flute Choir had the honor of premiering several new works written specifically for them! Andrea Myers and Bethany Gonella submitted a call for works through Charlie McCarron's blog/podcast, Composer Quest. Their quest was inspired by a fantastic collection of multi-level flute choir works by Noelle Perrin. Her works provide opportunities for beginner, intermediate, and advanced flute students to play together, and she often cleverly juxtaposes beginner melodies (such as Hot Cross Buns

or Mary Had a Little Lamb) with great classical works (like melodies from William Tell or Swan Lake). This Composer Quest challenged composers to write pieces for a flute choir with varied experience levels, and the Suzuki Flute Choir performed four of the resulting works at the Flute Choir Showcase.

FLUTE CHOIR SHOWCASE 2015

Saturday, February 28, 2015 proved to be a wonderful day for many flutists, families and friends. The UMFA Flute Choir Showcase 2015 was held at Richfield United Methodist Church from 9:00 am-4:00 pm. It was an exceptional new location with an expansive sanctuary space that lent itself well to having large groups up

at 9:00 am for rehearsal. They also had been in rehearsals for two previous Saturdays to prepare literature with their directors. Thus first off on the concert was the Honors Flute Quartet directed by Vanamali Medina. The selections they performed were Simple Gifts (Lombardo) and Evangeline and Gabriel from Legends from the

Trudi next introduced Flute Cocktail which is an exceptional Flute Choir directed by Cindy Farrell that performs extensively. Trudi explained to the young participants and their parents of how flute can continue to be important throughout one's entire lifetime as evidenced by these dedicated flute choir members and their skill level. We were treated to some wonderful selections: Swing Low, Sweet Chariot (Tucker), Lullaby of Birdland (Shearing), As Time Goes By (Hupfeld/Althouse) and Flutes and Vegetables (Cohen). Cindy Farrell explained that the group changes in terms of who plays what instruments for various pieces. Many of the members own their own extended instruments: piccolo, alto and bass, plus they have a great pianist in their group. Thus they can really tailor the sound for each selection. This flute choir is top notch and can really create some amazing styles and moods with their music. The young UMFA student members who were selected to be part of the Honors Flute Choir had arrived early

It was followed by Allegro-Quintet (Scarlati). Members Ava Bell, Zoe Brokering, Liana Hull, Ekaterina Miller (Alto) and Isabel Rowader (Alto) gave a very confident quintet performance showing forth enhanced listening and ensemble dynamic/rhythmic skills.

The Morning Concert finished with a presentation by the Suzuki Flute Choir directed by Bethany Gonella and Andrea Myers. They premiered new works for multi-level/varied experience flutes received via the recent Suzuki Flute Choir Composer Quest. The selections were Kagome Kagome: Bird in a Cage by Charlie McCarron, Crossing Bach by Mary Beth Huttlin, Itsy Bitsy Johnny by Brian Neurater, and All Blue Flutes by Dan Wheeler. Two of the composers were present at the concert and were acknowledged. It was delightful to hear the 14 member flute choir with participants of varied ages and abilities play together. Quite an opportunity for the very beginner

flutists (curved headjoints) to play a simple line while the more advanced players were soaring above them on complicated melody and harmony figures. It also seemed to be a good “mentor experience” for the more experienced flutists to inspire and guide the younger ones. They all seemed to be having a great time together!

As part of her announcements Trudi Anderson spoke of what a special opportunity it is for our student members to actually play some of the extended members of the flute family such as piccolo, alto, bass and now the new UMFA contrabass. That is one of the advantages of offering the Honors Flute Choir experience, plus students have the chance to work under excellent directors on advanced literature.

The eight member Hopewell Flute Choir directed by Andrea Myers performed three movements from Four Spirituals for Flute Choir (Louke). Wade in the Water, Elijah Rock and Every Time I Feel the Spirit had audience members moving and tapping to the music. You could tell there was a supportive rapport and joy in this group! FluteSpiration Quartet began with an antiphonal (players spread throughout the sanctuary) sound for Praise and Longing (Bourgeois/Palestrina, arr. Trudi Anderson) which came together at the front of the church. They then shared some of the favorite tunes from the opera Carmen by Bizet with excellent arrangements by Kane and Holcombe. This group has a long history together and consists of a number of members from the Medalist Concert Band flute section. They chose some challenging literature: Sleigh Ride (Delius, arr. Nourse), Allegro from Concerto in E Minor (Vivaldi, arr. Nourse), and The Comedians Gallop (Kabalevsky, arr. Lombardo). The Afternoon Concert concluded with two exceptional pieces performed by the combined Honors Flute Choir. Directors Vanamali Medina and Sandra Sheih shared responsibilities. The first selection Masques (McGinty) was a challenging piece of intertwining colors and patterns. The second selection was Renaissance for a New Millennium (Lombardo) which truly showed the excellent abilities of these fine young flutists. Vanamali stepped in to play the contrabass for Renaissance which really grounded the sound of the flute choir with a beautiful deep tone quality. This sectionalized work had extensive difficult technical passages as well as moving melodic sections with some improvisation periods as well. The students really had a good “work out” both in learning and performing this literature. UMFA is very proud of them and their accomplishment!

It was a marvelous day filled with great music, companionship and fun! It was great to see so many parents holding up their iPhones to catch their child’s performance. As Trudi said in her concluding thank you comments to the audience: there were over 60 flutists involved in the event (42 adults, 23 youth = 65), with a variety of flute ensembles represented and a large audience in attendance. Way to go UMFA!
